Teaching Artist Terry Boyarsky Integrates Music and Math at Bigelow Hill

Teaching artist Terry Boyarsky visited Mrs. Davis' and Mrs. Nissen's fifth grade classes at Bigelow Hill on February 24. Ms. Boyarsky led the students in musical games and rhythmic exercises to help them grasp the concepts of how math relates to time and space. The activities presented different strategies to teach fractions, ratios and percentages that work well in differentiated classrooms.

The previous evening, Ms. Boyarsky presented her techniques to 35 educators and pre-service educators in her professional development workshop, "Dividing Time/Dividing Space: a Study of Increments, Ratios, and Proportions using Music & Movement."

Terry Boyarsky holds a BA in experimental psychology from Reed College, a BM in Eurhythmics from Cleveland Institute of Music, and an MA in Ethnomusicology from Kent State University. She is a licensed Dalcroze Eurhythmics teacher, is certified in Orff Schulwerk, presents workshops nationally, and has published many articles.

Ms. Boyarsky's workshop and classroom visit were made possible through Findlay City Schools Title I funds. Her 2-day residency was part of the Hancock County John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts Partners in Education Program that includes Findlay City Schools, Hancock County Schools, The University of Findlay, and The Arts Partnership of Greater Hancock County.

Student Auditions are held annually and sponsored by the Buckeye Chapter of NATS and sanctioned by the Great Lakes Region of the National Association of Teachers of Singing.

The Auditions are planned for students at all stages of vocal study, who perform in clearly defined classifications with students of similar age and length of study.

Fifth Graders Enjoy Space

Fifteen fifth graders from each of the five intermediate buildings worked together in Space teams, depending on their skills, to prepare for the Space Simulation at Challenger Learning Center of Lucas County in Oregon, OH on April 30. The students need time to work together because on April 30 they will be on a space mission. Their mission will be to establish a permanent base on the moon to observe and explore. Navigating their way into lunar orbit, students must construct and launch a probe and analyze a variety of data gathered from the lunar surface to select a site for the permanent moon base. Because of their specific skills each student has become an expert in a specific area. The teams are: communications, data, navigation, probe, and remote. Half the 75 students will do the simulation in the morning and the half in the afternoon on April 30 with activities in a lab corresponding to the time when the other group is doing the simulation.

Students have been working on the Space topic since November one day a week after school.

The six Science Communities teachers will be there also. There are two from Lincoln, Cesar Ruiz and Rhonda Simons. The other teachers are Deb Wickerham (CH), Kim Betts (WA), Beth Ann Nissen (BH), and Don Schmidt (WV).

The Arts Partnership is pleased to announce that we will be offering the Youtheatre Summer Performing Arts Camp during the week of July 12! Theatre professionals from the Missoula Children's Theatre (MCT) will be on hand to help us produce the musical *The Frog Prince* for two public performances on July 16 and 17. The camp and performances will be held at The First Presbyterian Church in Findlay.

The Camp is open to the first 64 students in grades 1-12 (2010-2011 school year) based on age and role availability. On-stage cast roles are available for 60 students in various age ranges. Four students in grades 6-12 will serve as assistant directors. All students registered for the camp will audition on Monday morning of the camp (no preparation required) and receive their assignments for the musical. Rehearsals will be held throughout the week. When students are not rehearsing they will participate in theatre-related workshops presented by local theatre professionals.

The camp is held each day from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. On Friday, July 16, we will hold a dress rehearsal from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m., followed by a performance at 7 p.m. There will also be a performance at 4 p.m. on Saturday, July 17. Because of our producing a show in a short timeframe, it is imperative that each camper is in attendance at all rehearsals and workshops throughout the week.

Due to the popularity of the camp last year, we anticipate that this year's camp will fill up quickly. 

Safety Tip: Serving Food Safely

♦ Never leave it out over 2 hrs. (1 hr in temp. > 90 °F) Bacteria that cause food borne illness grow rapidly at room temp.

Keep hot food hot! Cold food cold!

- ♦ When serving food at a buffet, keep hot food over a heat source and keep cold food on ice. Keep platters of food refrigerated until time to serve or heat them.
- ♦ Carry perishable picnic food in a cooler with a cold pack or ice. Set the cooler in the shade and open as little as possible.

Handling Leftovers Safely

- ♦ Divide foods into shallow containers for rapid cooling. Put food directly in the refrigerator or freezer.
- Cut turkey off the bone and refrigerate. Slice breast meat; legs and wings may be left whole.
- ♦ Use cooked leftovers within 4 days.
- ◆ Cut or cooked produce items, such as baked potatoes or vegetable casseroles, should never be left out or held at room temperature for an extended time period.
